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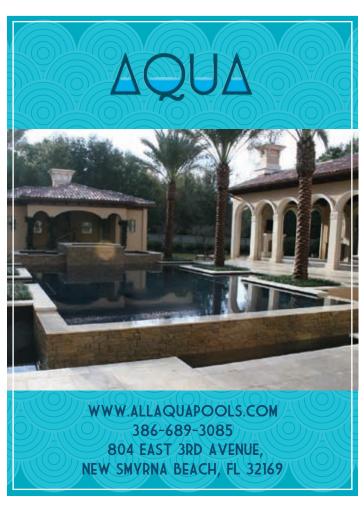
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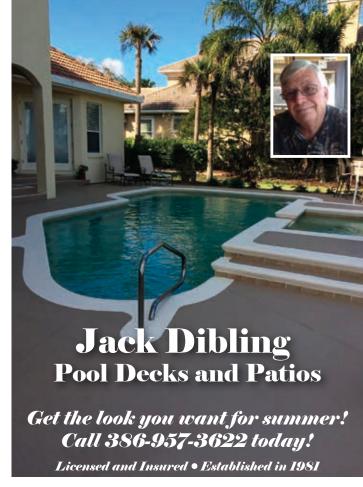


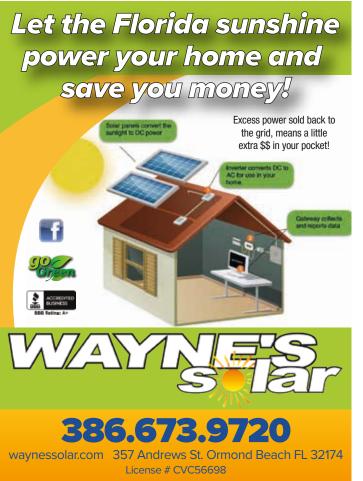
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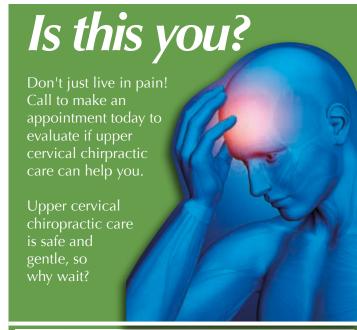


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PART II: WHO SHOULD HAVE GOLF CART **Insurance**



Anyone that owns and/or operates a cart, whether street legal or not, should be adequately insured, especially for bodily injury and property damage that one may cause to others.

A Low Speed Vehicle (LSV) registered and tagged is required to comply with Florida insurance laws, just as any street legal personal vehicle. If one fails to maintain insurance, the registered owner's license will be suspended. The minimum coverage required for a registered/tagged vehicle is just like your personal vehicle(s): Personal Injury Protection (PIP No Fault) and Property Damage (PD) coverage.

However, consider adding medical payments, comprehensive and collision and Uninsured/Underinsured Motorist (UM) coverage as you would typically insure your personal use. Also, only a licensed driver may drive an LSV, so don't confuse this with a regular golf cart.

A golf cart used for personal use as transportation, within your private community or around your property, should maintain liability in the event you or the driver causes bodily injury or property damage to others.

A golf cart is not considered a motor vehicle, will not be registered or tagged and is not intended to be used on public roads.

Many insurance carriers may extend some protection under their homeowner policy, but you can also purchase insurance under a recreation policy. Read your policy to make sure it is endorsed or affords adequate protection to cover you and/or the driver.

Golf carts and LSVs can be dangerous, plus they offer little protection compared to a normal size vehicle. They have become popular, and owners tend to let others use their carts but should use caution when doing so. The risk factor is much greater. Also, some propin beach communities, but may find their carrier will not provide coverage for this usage. It is recommended that you do not have these vehicles available since tenants can typically rent locally.

Hurricane Preparations:

Dear Venetian Bay owners,

As you may already be aware, hurricane season is officially here. From June 1 to November 30, we will all be keeping a watchful eye on the weather for tropical updates, storms and hurricanes. Hurricane Matthew was a good reminder that the season is not over until it is over. It was also a reminder that preparation and anticipation is necessary throughout the entire season and not just the hot summer months. Don't let a few years of relatively quiet seasons produce hurricane complacency. It is easy to get relaxed and forget how devastating a storm can be, as Matthew proved at the end of the season last year. With that, the association is ready to handle this season as it comes and would like to give some resources to help you out in preparing.

Here are the current predictions from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA):

Predicting 11 to 17 named storms.

- * Five to nine reach hurricane status.
- *Two to four become major hurricanes.

Prior to the hurricane:

Listen to the County Warning System on the radio. Do exactly as advised. Make plans to relocate outside the affected area. Have current information on the location of the Red Cross shelters and directions to get there. If there are ill or disabled persons in the home, contact their

doctor for instructions.

If the County Warning System requires relocation, do so early to avoid traffic jams and dangerous winds. Be sure to take necessities such as prescriptions, bedding, enough food for 24 hours, flashlights and a battery-powered radio. If you evacuate, take your valuables, pets and refrigerated/frozen food with you. Turn off all electrical appliances.

Clear off balconies, terraces and patios. Place rolled towels around the bottom of all exterior doors and windows. Use sand bags if they are available.

Close all blinds to avoid shattering glass. Do not tape any windows. Windows may be boarded from the outside only.

Any repairs needed from damage caused to the building by the resident from boarding windows will be the financial responsibility of the resident.

Fill the bathroom tub with water. This water may be used for drinking should the water supply become interrupted or contaminated. It may also be poured into the toilet bowl to induce flushing.

Stock up on daily necessities. Items such as the following are a must: non-perishable food, bottled water, first aid kits, blankets, can opener, batteries, battery-powered radio, prescriptions, diapers, baby food,

extra eyeglasses, hearing aids and battery-powered lanterns.

Fill all vehicles with gas. In the event of loss of electricity, the gas pumps will not operate.

Have enough cash on-hand. In the event of loss of electricity, ATMs and debit/credit card machines will not operate.

Carry all important paperwork and personal identification with you.

Pursuant to your documents, all residents are required to carry homeowners insurance. To assist your carrier in the event of a loss, make a complete inventory of personal property. An inventory checklist can be obtained from your insurance representative. Store this and other important documents in waterproof containers or in a waterproof safety deposit box.

During the hurricane:

Continue to listen to the County Warning System on the radio. Do exactly as advised.

Stay indoors! If the calm eye of the hurricane passes through the area, continue to stay indoors unless it is absolutely necessary to leave.

If the electricity goes off, turn off or unplug all hazardous appliances. (i.e. stove, iron, curling irons, blow-dryers) Use flashlights instead of candles or kerosene lamps. Please be aware that emergency building lights and fire safety devices will become inactive. Take necessary precautions.

Use the telephone for emergencies only. Jammed phone lines may obstruct emergency calls for police, fire departments, doctors and the Red Cross disaster units.

Conserve refrigeration. Open the refrigerator/freezer door as little possible.

Remain indoors until the official "all clear" is given from the County Warning System on the radio.

After the hurricane:

If you vacated your home prior to the storm, before returning, please check with your local authorities to determine the condition of the roads and the surrounding area.

Beware of outdoor hazards. Watch out for loose or dangling power lines and report them immediately to the proper authority. All emergency numbers are in the white pages of the telephone book.

Walk or drive cautiously. Debris-filled streets are very dangerous.

Snakes and poisonous insects may be a hazard. Washouts may weaken road and bridge structures, which could collapse under vehicle weight.

Use caution when cooking while flames are present. A gust of wind through a door or window could start an accidental fire, and the fire department may not be readily available while hurricane winds are

blowing. Grills must be used in accordance with community and city policies.

Open the refrigerator only when necessary. Food will spoil in the refrigerator if the power is off more than a few hours.

Do not use water until authorities have issued the area to be a "safe water area." Use the emergency supply in the tub or boil water. Report broken sewer or water mains to the proper authority. Please limit usage of water and toilet facilities.

Take extra precautions to prevent fire. Lowered water pressure in city mains and the interruption of other services may make fire-fighting extremely difficult after a hurricane.

Notify your insurance carrier in the event of losses and where you may be reached.

Please wipe all moisture from windows and doors. Be patient. It takes a team effort to clean up after a storm. Responsibility for the cleanup falls to numerous local, state and federal agencies. The property management staff will assist with the community's cleanup.

As you can imagine, many of the vendors and contractors we depend on to provide parts, labor, or technical assistance may be stretched to the limit; therefore, the response to service requests in your area may be delayed. We sincerely appreciate your cooperation and patience during the aftermath of these storms.

Should damage to your property occur, management will conduct a thorough inspection of the common areas to assess the damages. A schedule will then be prepared to complete the necessary repairs. All life-safety issues will be responded to accordingly.

Please take the time be as prepared as possible.

We hope you are enjoying your summer here in Florida. This is the time of summer vacations with the kids out of school and the warm Florida summer. Here are a few things to keep in mind with your security and safety for the summer.

FIRST: When you are leaving for vacation or the beach, don't put it all over social media. There are more than just your friends that troll Facebook and other sites. Criminals are known to use Facebook and other sites to see who is going out of town. Criminals also study social media to see when people are having big events and other social gatherings at their home. This enables them to case a neighborhood with ease and causes less suspicion. Please tell your children not to post on sites before they leave also. This is important because their friends have friends also that you may not know. It only takes one person to tell someone about your home. If that is the wrong person, they may try to break in while you are gone. People do not need to know where you are going; tell them where you have been afterward. It is safer for you and your family.

SECOND: When you are leaving, arrange for your mail to stop if you are going to be gone for more than a day or two. Also, arrange for your newspapers to be picked up, even the free papers that are tossed in your driveway. It is smart to check all the doors and windows to make sure they are all locked, as someone might have left one open and forgot to lock it. Or worst yet, somebody might have been visiting your house and left one unlocked for later use. Turn your alarm on. Call your local alarm company and tell them you are leaving and no one should be in your home while on vacation. The police get dispatched first. Check your video surveillance system to make sure your phone app is working so you can check your home while away. Please check these a few days before leaving, as it is hard to get service if needed 10 minutes before you have to catch a flight. Most local security companies will accommodate your schedule for service.

THIRD: Your children may be home from school, by themselves. Teach them not to open the door for strangers and to report to you if they see strange people in the neighborhood. Make sure your children know how to use the alarm; this will provide a text to your phone every time they leave or come home, so you don't have to worry as much. You can also use your video cameras to see who is coming by your home to visit or use the pool. This will help you avoid risks.

unfortunate that not all of will age the same. Some will need assistance, such as an emergency response units that can track wherever you go and provide help when needed. Whether it's for the adventure, stress release or a sense of sisterhood, women are riding motorcycles with an increased voracity. Female motorcycle ownership is at an all-time high—and so are the number of ladies-only bike groups.

Venetian Bay now has its own ladies group. Formed by three fun-loving friends, the women call themselves the Juliets, standing for Joyful Untamed Ladies Inspiring Everyone to Soar. Appropriately named, the Juliets are united by their passion for riding and their desire to support one another.

The group's leader, Faith Stouffer, is an experienced rider. Faith has been riding her Harley with her husband,
Jeff, nearly every day since she completed the Florida licensing course
two years ago. Together, the Stouffers
lead the local coed Let's Ride group
on weekly excursions. Shortly after
two of the women in the group bought
Spyders, the ladies started riding on
their own.

"Some of our husbands ride with a guys-only group on Tuesdays," said Faith. "So we decided to start our own weekly ride."

The group includes women of various riding abilities and styles—and sometimes a few non-riders from the neighborhood, who tag along on the back of their bikes for the fun of it.

With the help of a few other veteran Harley riders, Faith is mentoring new bike owners Carmel Vaden and Lee DeLieto.

"We started out just venturing over to restaurants on the Beachside," she explained. "Now, we're taking longer lunch rides to Sandford and Deland. The goal is to push the newbies a little farther outside of their comfort zone every week and to get them used to riding with a group. These ladies are having a ball and rapidly becoming pros."

The Romeos

A new generation of bikers is taking to the road. They're not your typical twenty-something speed freaks. The silver-haired 60 and "70-somethings" have been there, done that. Now, they just want to sit back and enjoy the ride.

Many have flocked to sunny Florida. A large number of senior bikers have retired in Venetian Bay, where they can bike year-round and enjoy the camaraderie of like-minded motorcycle enthusiasts. And more and more are joining motorcycle clubs. Here in Venetian Bay, riders have numerous options, ranging from couples' groups to the oldest – and undoubtedly the king of the road–the New Smyrna Beach Chapter of the Romeos (Retired Old Men Eating Out).

Established in 1998 by Harley Bob with only three riders, the chapter now boasts almost 40 members on its official roster and even more when the snowbirds are in town. 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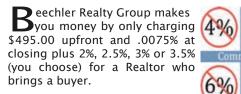


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Prep 10m Cook 20m Ready In 30m

For a less spicy version, cut down on the curry powder. Serve over hot boiled rice.

Ingredients:

I teaspoon vegetable oil, or as needed

3/4 pound lean ground beef

1 onion, chopped

I clove garlic, minced

2 teaspoons curry powder

I small head of cabbage, shredded

2 tablespoons ketchup

2 teaspoons mango chutney

I teaspoon salt, or to taste

I tablespoon water, or as needed

Directions:

Heat vegetable oil in a skillet over medium heat. Cook ground beef until browned, 7 to 10 minutes. Transfer ground beef to a plate to drain; reserve remaining oil in skillet.

Return skillet to medium heat with residual oil. Add onion, garlic, and curry powder; cook and stir until onion is almost tender, 5 to 7 minutes. Stir cooked ground beef and cabbage into onion mixture; stir in ketchup, chutney, and salt. Sprinkle on a little water to prevent burning, but not enough to make the curry wet. Cook and stir until cabbage is just tender and flavors have combined, 7 to 10 minutes more.

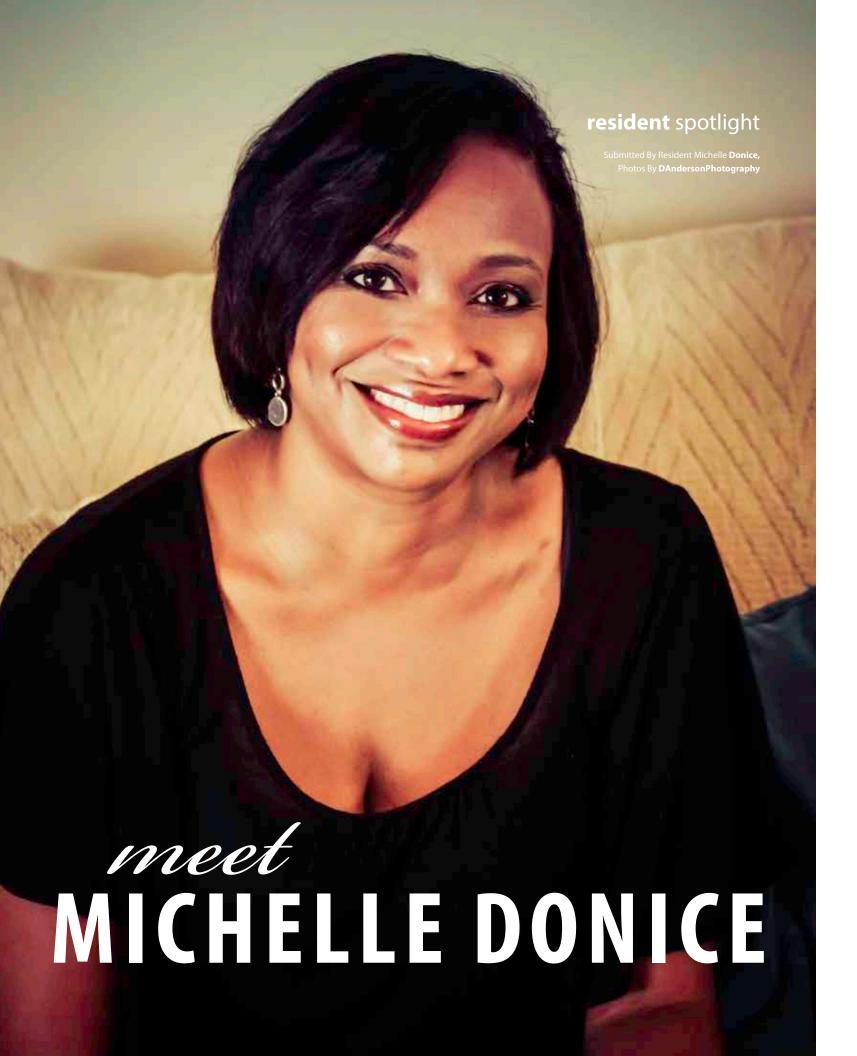
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Tell us a little about yourself and your background.

Any tips on how to get through the dreaded writer's block?

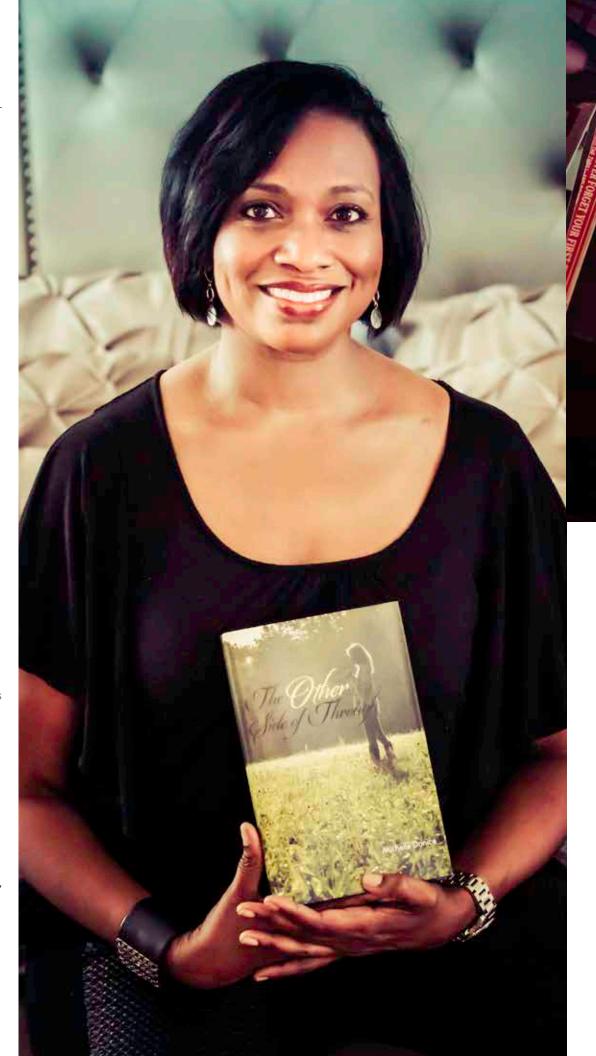
